ONE YEAR LATER

A year has passed since the International Consortium of Investigative Journalists (ICIJ) was given control of a database full of stolen files and used it to present the world with a misguided view of the services we provide, misrepresenting the nature of the industry and its role in global financial markets. Some international organizations orchestrated the dissemination of publications plagued by speculation and data that is out of context in order to meet their personal agendas.

We continue to ask ourselves, is it legal to utilize stolen information to back theories and take advantage of a general unfamiliarity with the work firms like ours do in order to discredit a legitimate service offered in various countries?

Everything seems to indicate that, since the conception of the "Panama Papers", this act, rather than condemning a prestigious company, sought to solely attack the Panamanian financial system (its name clearly confirms this).

To date, nowhere in the world has the firm been presented with formal charges, only in Panama, where the irregularities and illegalities of the Attorney General's Office clearly show that once again we are part of a hidden agenda, but this time aimed at diverting attention on confessed crimes committed in Panama.

Mossack Fonseca continues its plea for justice, reiterating our commitment to cooperate with the authorities in order to prove that no illicit act has been committed, fighting to compensate the collateral damage caused to the country, the firm, the people that form part of it and our clients.
